NIGERIA'S INVOLVEMENT IN FP2020

- **FP 2020** is a global partnership to **empower women and girls** by investing in their **rights-based family planning**.

Nigerian Government committed to embark on deliberate efforts to ensure sustainable financing for the National Family Planning program. Specially, the Federal Ministry of Health (FMoH) will ensure provision of US\$4M annually from 2017 to 2020 for procurement of contraceptive for the public sector (an increase from the US\$3M committed from 2011 to 2014) including payment of backlog of commitments for 2013 & 2014 in line with 2012 and 2017 London FP Summits

How does the Motion Tracker work?

The Motion Tracker is a customized, dynamic framework for strengthening accountability and drive action by keeping commitments visible and highlighting progress while fostering partner participation, engagement and ownership to address bottlenecks to achieving commitments.

work with government and local partners to identify FP2020 commitments

CLASSIFICATION OF COMMITMENTS

collaborate with government and civil society to classify commitments as either implicit or explicit statements

03

DECONSTRUCTION OF COMMITMENTS

deconstruct the commitments by analyzing background documents

04

CATEGORIZATION OF COMMITMENTS

categorize the commitments according to the World Health Organization (WHO) health system building blocks

05

DEVELOPMENT OF COMMITMENT PERFORMANCE INDICATORS

work with a network of family planning practitioners and policymakers to develop performance indicators for tracking progress against each commitment statement

06

IMPLEMENTATION WITH TARGETED PARTNER ENGAGEMENT

engage stakeholders to identify and acknowledge partner action, showcase progress and celebrate success as well as identify barriers and actions to accelerate progress

METHODOLOGY

- Data collection was conducted for period **July – December 2019 and covering Q1-Q3 of 2020**
- Employed both Primary and Secondary data sources
- 32 Organisations were reached
- 20 Organisations responded
- Internal validation was done through triangulation and cross consultation

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


Cross-sectoral collaboration initiated by FMoH to address the socio-cultural barriers to family planning

IDENTIFIED BARRIERS

COMMITMENT 1:

- Inadequate allocation of sufficient resources to FP.
- Overall reduction of health sector annual budget, making it difficult to make a case for FP budget increase.
- Minimal advocacy to meet the funding gap for FP
- Minimal engagement with NHIS and BHCPF on FP funding

COMMITMENT 2:

- *Scale-up uptake of DMPAC SC in the remaining 26 states, with support from partners*
- *Scale-up the use of the eLMIS in all public sector facilities*

IDENTIFIED BARRIERS

COMMITMENT 3:

- Revise and update Family Life Health Education Curriculum
- No multi-sectoral platform coordinating FP activities under Ministry of Finance, Budget & National Planning and Nigeria Governors Forum



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
